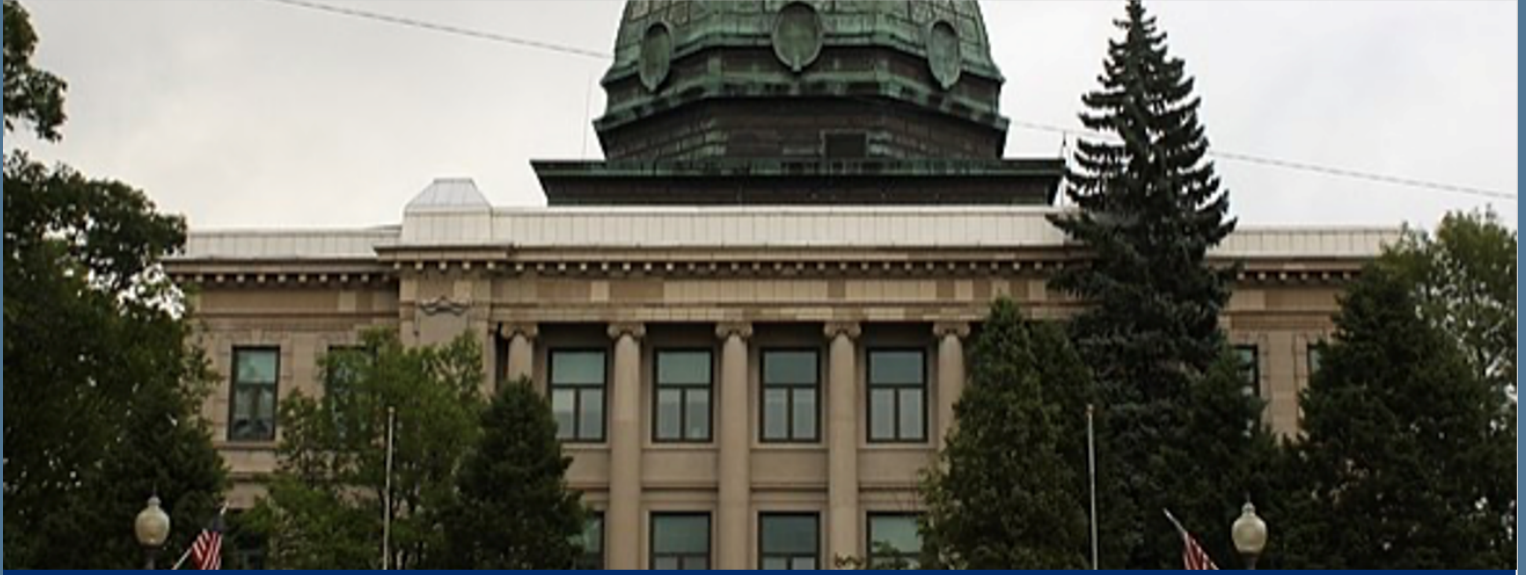

What Happened at the Conversation?

- Participants reviewed Data Walk information
- Participants were then grouped into 4 tables, one for each of the chosen health priority areas
- Groups reviewed and discussed data about each area and answered the following questions

1. What are the top measures/data points that stand out to you?
2. What is your personal/professional experience with this issue in Oneida County?
3. Are there any data point(s) you would like to know more about?

- Participants then voted on the top indicators for each area

Health Priority Selection

Health Priority Areas were voted on by the community:

1. Participants at the Community Conversation Data Walk voted on the top areas of concerns for community/individual health
2. A health priority survey was conducted and released to the community to narrow down the top areas of concern to the top 4 health concerns

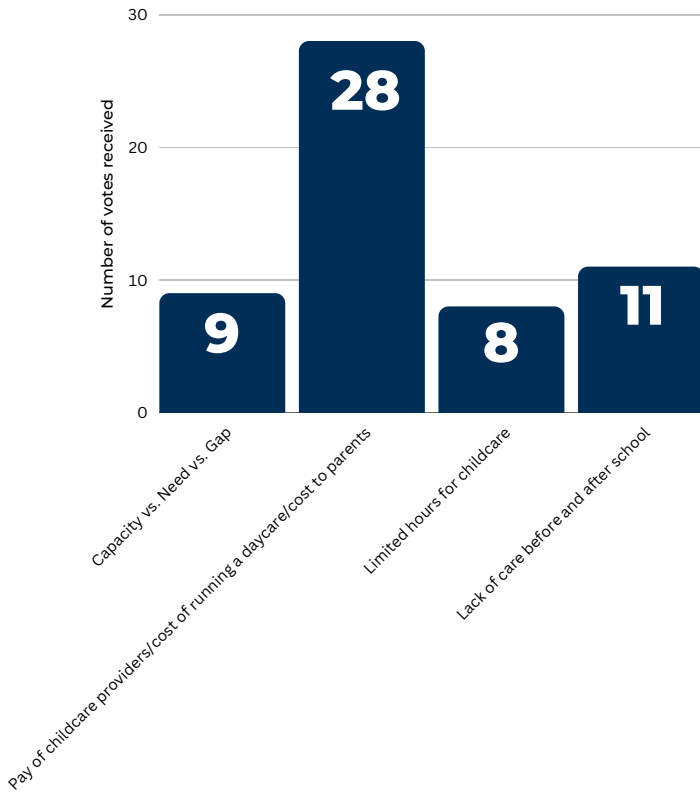

Top data points in Health Priority Areas that stood out to participants

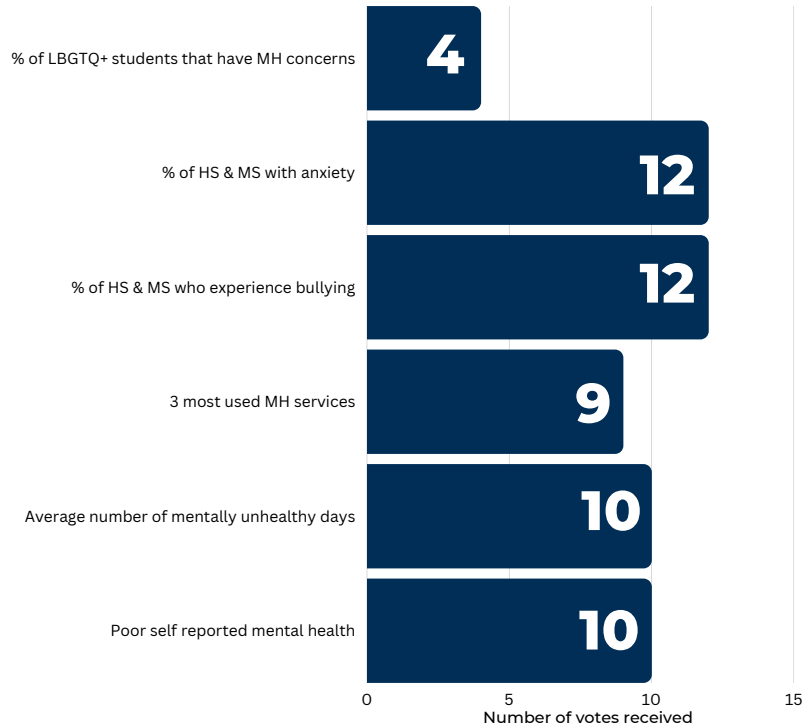
Childcare

Themes: Access/Availability, Capacity, Cost



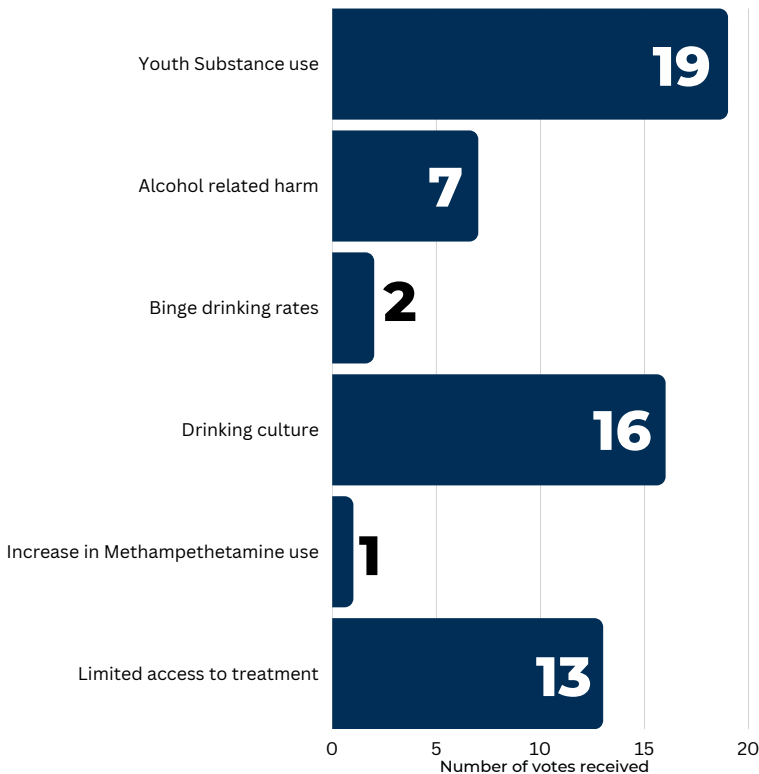
Mental Health

Themes: Not enough providers, Access, Time



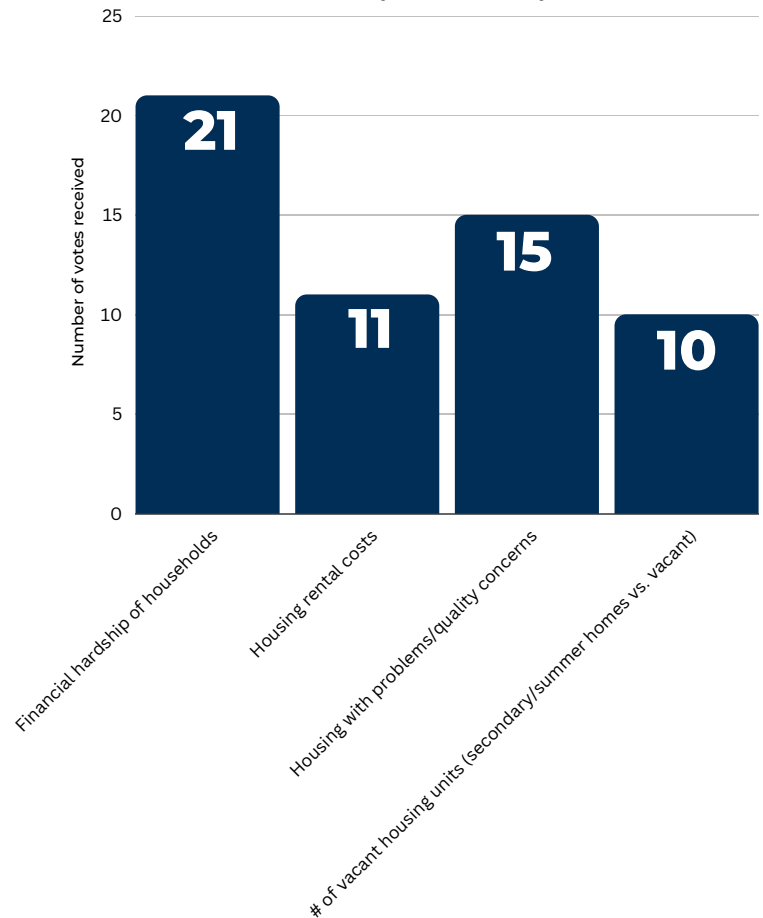
Substance/Alcohol Use

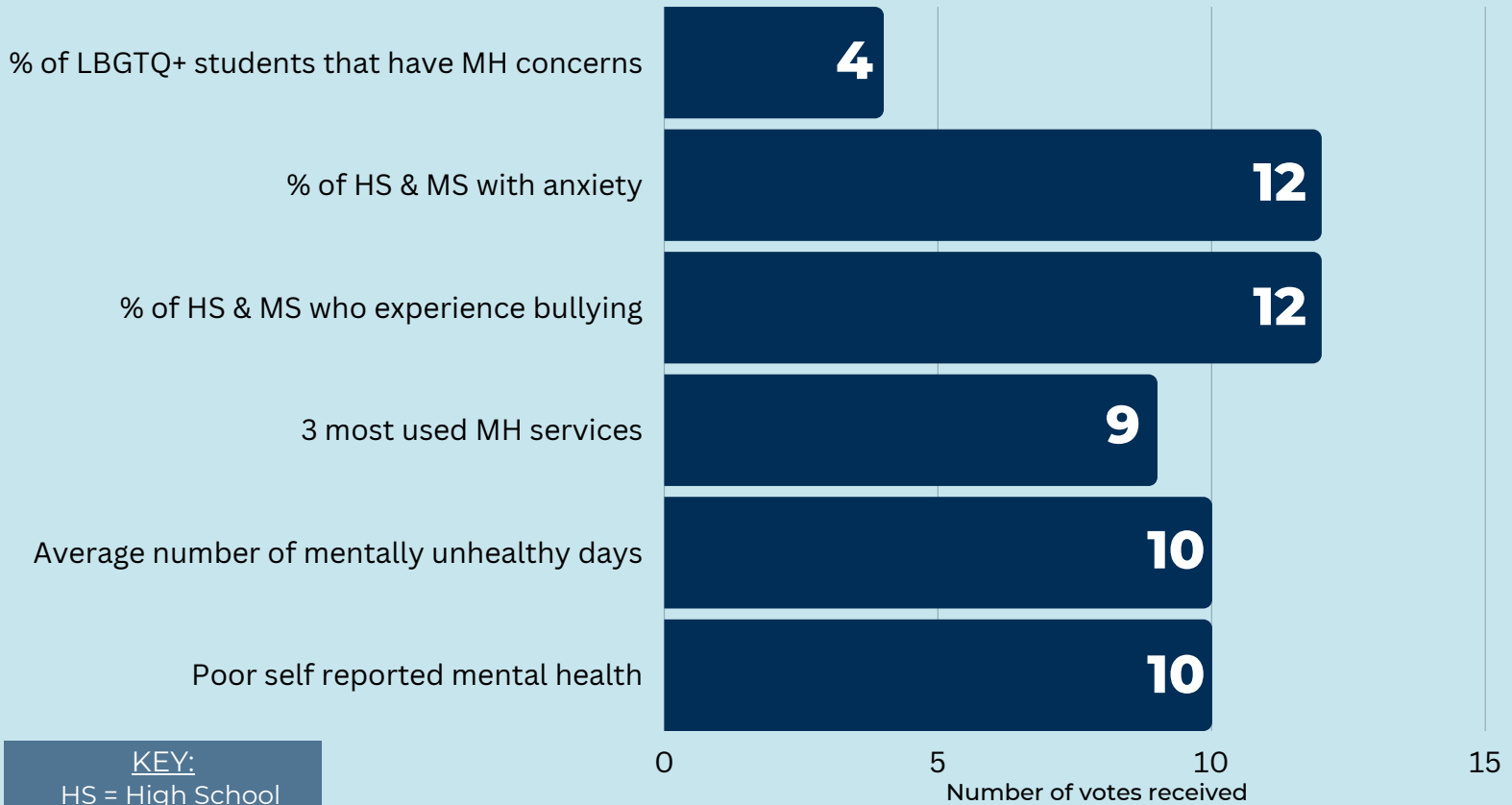
Themes: Quality, Affordability, Access

Top data points that stood out to participants



KEY:

Other data points that stood out:

- The percent of high school and middle school students that could turn to at least one adult, besides parents.

Data point(s) you would like to know more about:

- Actual anxiety and depression data (not survey data)
- What has changed at school systemically
- Is there state average for Mental Health ACES data?

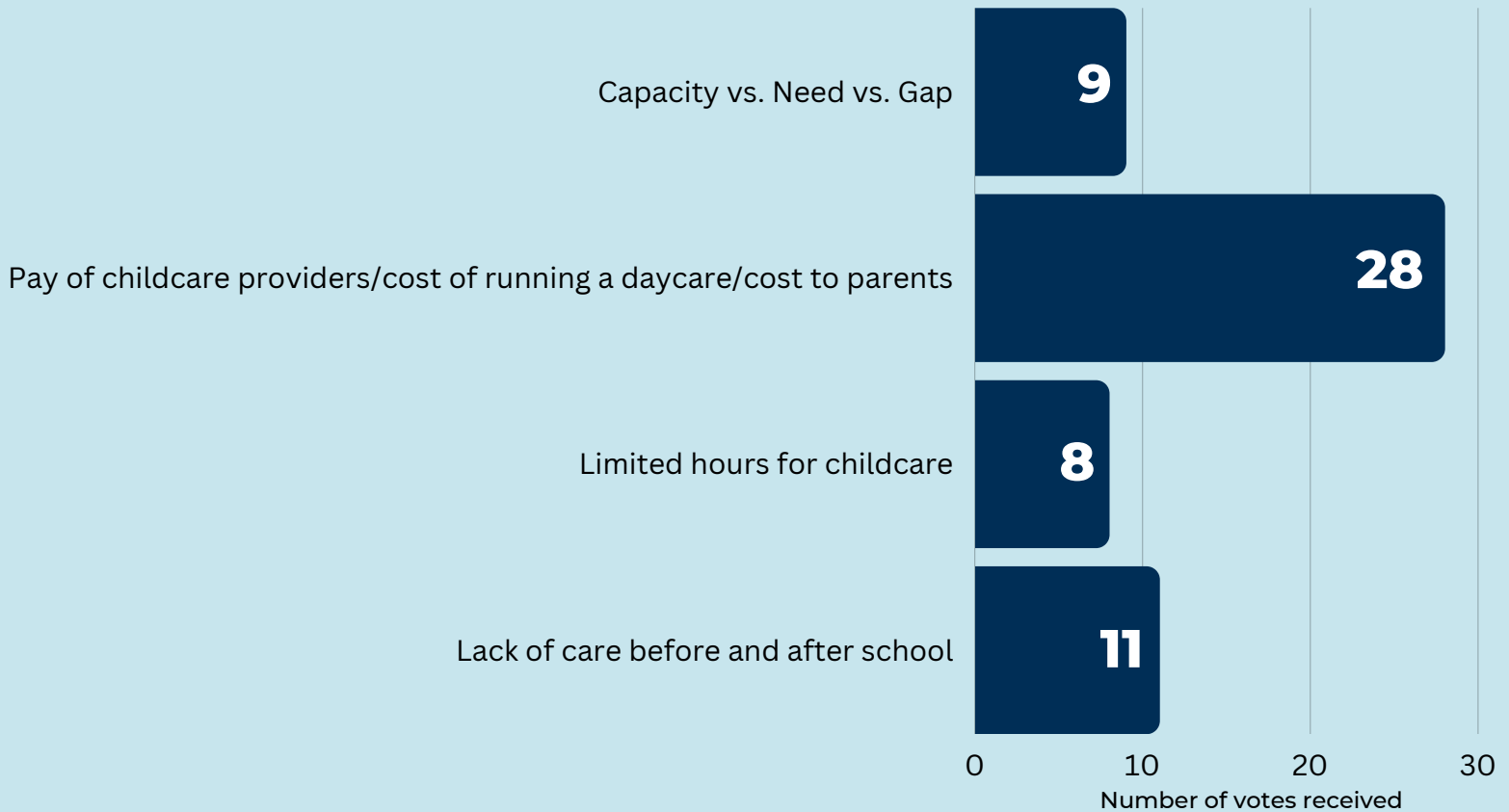
What does ACES mean?

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) are traumatic events that occur before a child reaches the age of 18.

Childcare

Themes: Access/Availability, Capacity, Cost

Top data points that stood out to participants



Other data points that stood out:

- Location of childcare vs. location of families
- Regulations placed on facilities to make caring for children possible
- Serve special needs children, ability to serve their population

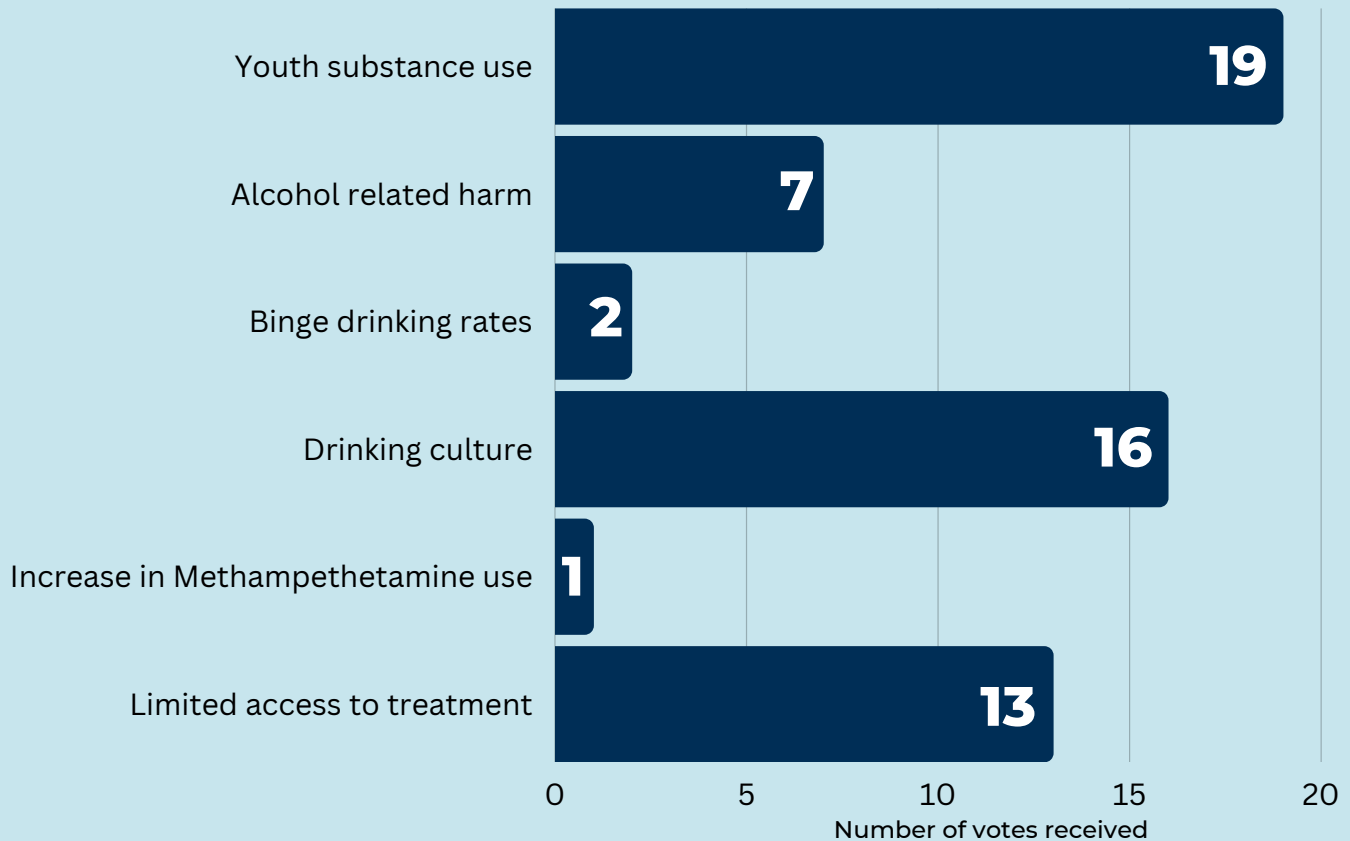
Data point(s) you would like to know more about:

- Money cost due to employees missing work
- Demographic of our county by age
- How many childcare facilities accept childcare subsidy or financial need assistance
- What is the percentage of woman returning to the workforce after having children
- Employer's policy
- School age care/after school care
- Older children needing childcare
- Transportation

Substance/Alcohol Use

Themes: *Connection between Mental Health and Substance Use (coping technique)

Top data points that stood out to participants



Other data points that stood out:

- Costs of drinking to the community
- Drinking and driving rates - youth and adults

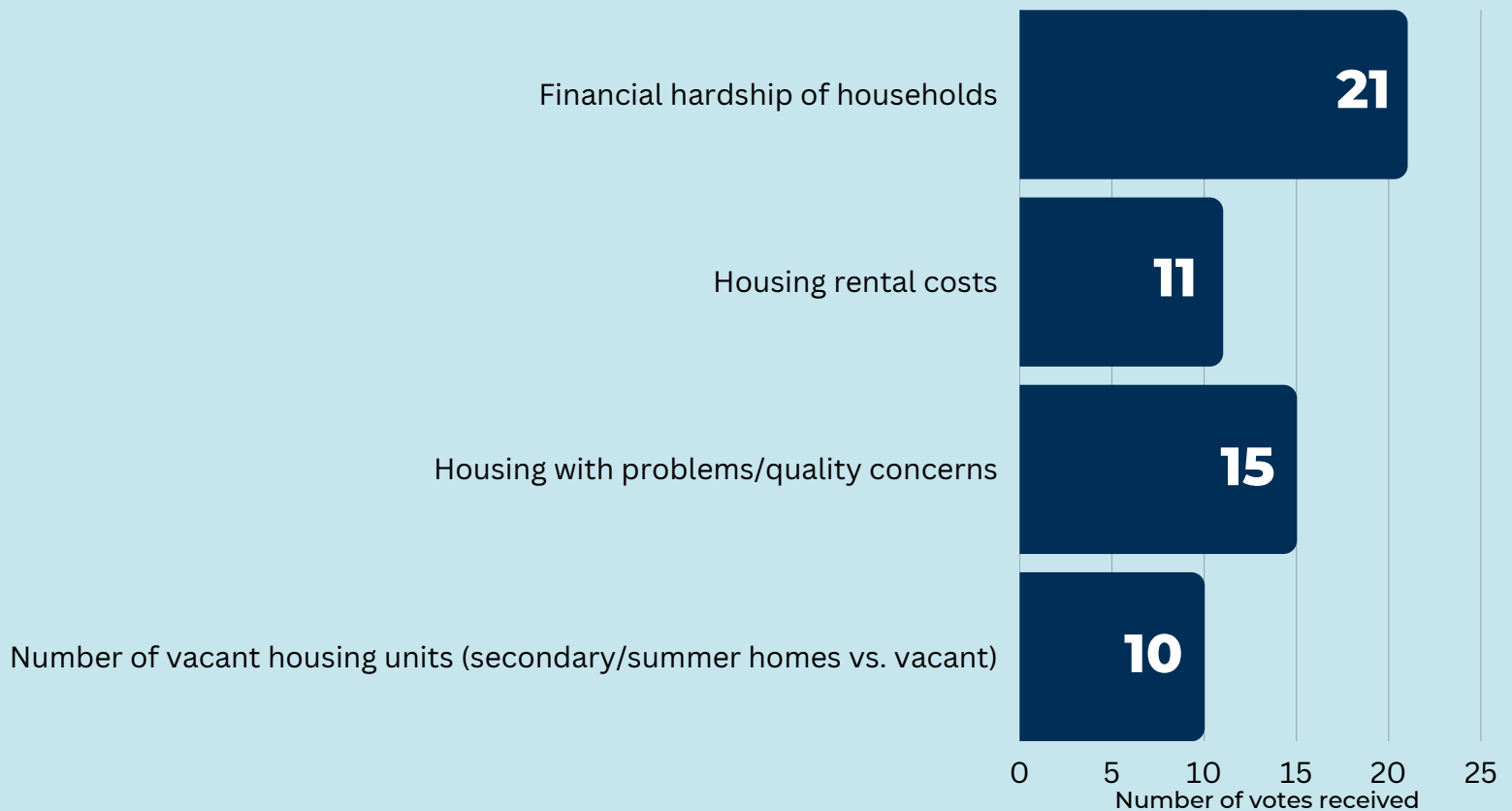
Data point(s) you would like to know more about:

- Youth - what other sober activities are available
- Youth access - where is it coming from?
- What does substance use look like in other counties?
- Interconnection of substance use.
- Opioid use data and treatment data.
- Female substance use (under represented?)

Housing

Themes: Quality, Affordability, Access

Top data points that stood out to participants



Other data points that stood out:

- Income going to housing (cost & several cost burden)
- Ownership of occupied units/number of summer homes
- Current housing that meets needs
- Not enough money/income made

Data point(s) you would like to know more about:

- ALICE data - qualifications table
- Data preventing residents from getting into the workforce
- Number of apartments that are low income
- Density location of housing
- The type of land in Oneida County (land locked, marsh land)/developmental land available
- College housing
- Percent of the workforce that are tradespersons/
electrician/plumbers/carpenters

What does ALICE mean?

ALICE is an acronym for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed — households that earn more than the Federal Poverty Level, but less than the basic cost of living for the county.
