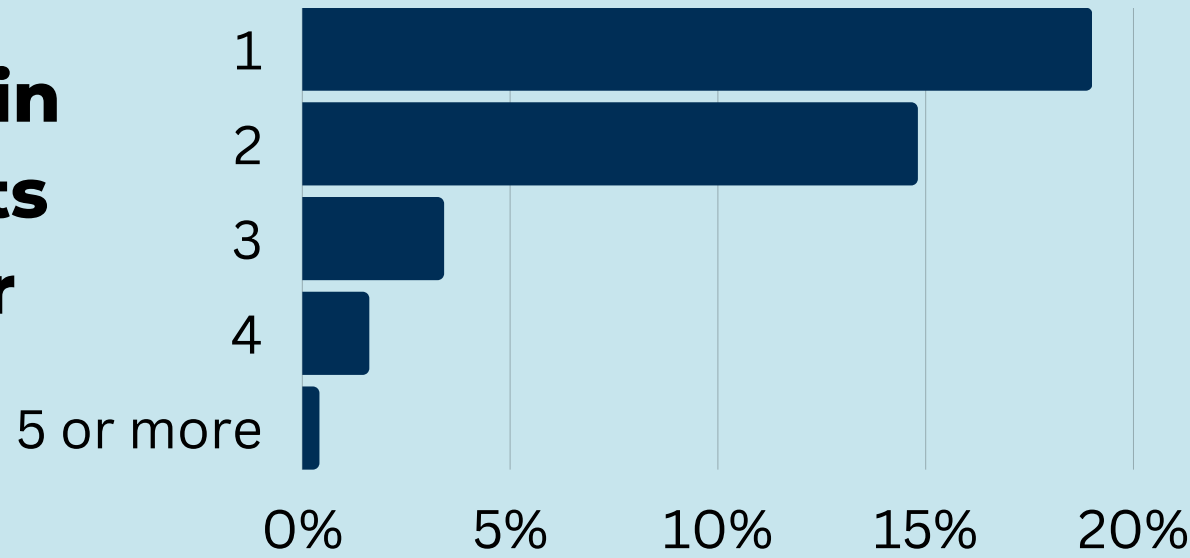

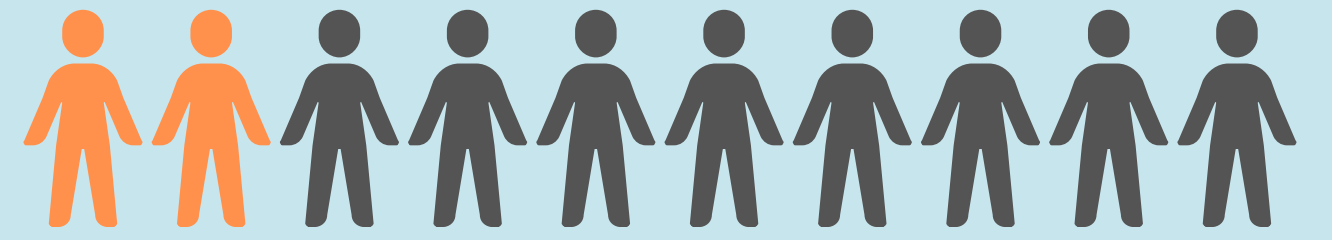

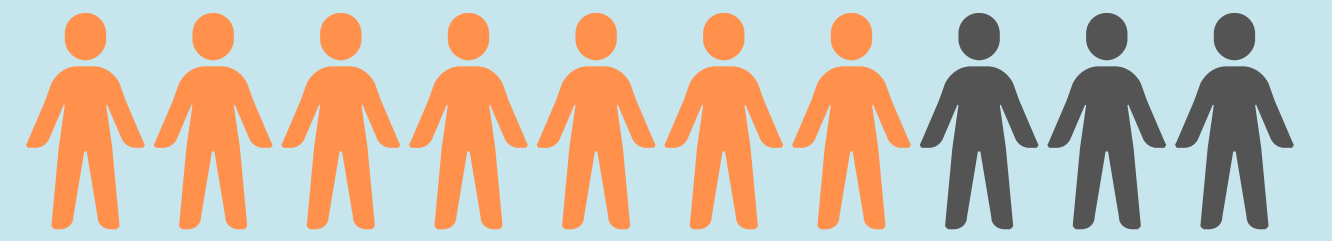
Number of people in survey respondents households under the age of 18:

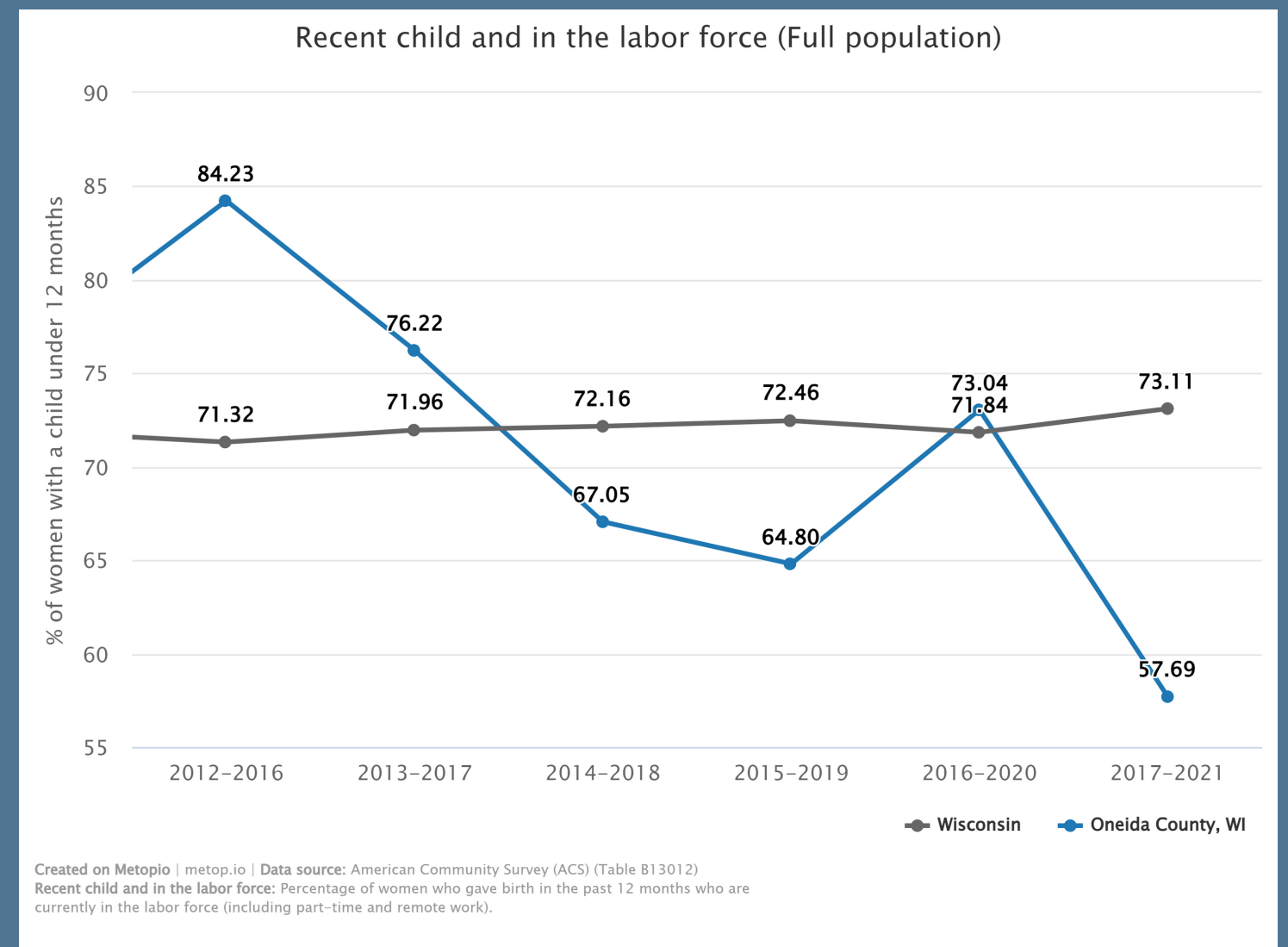

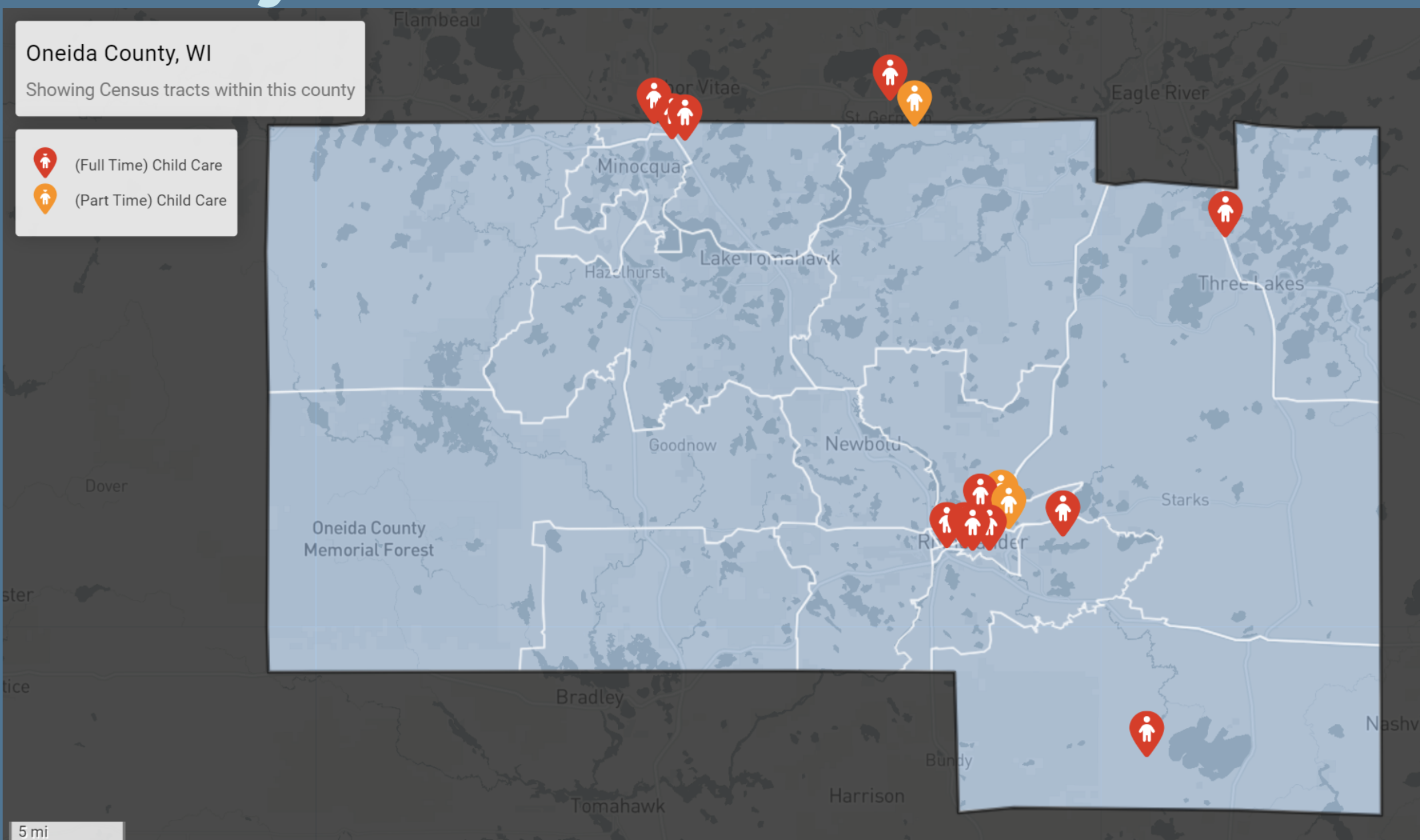
Focus Group response: What are the top three things that need to be improved in our community?

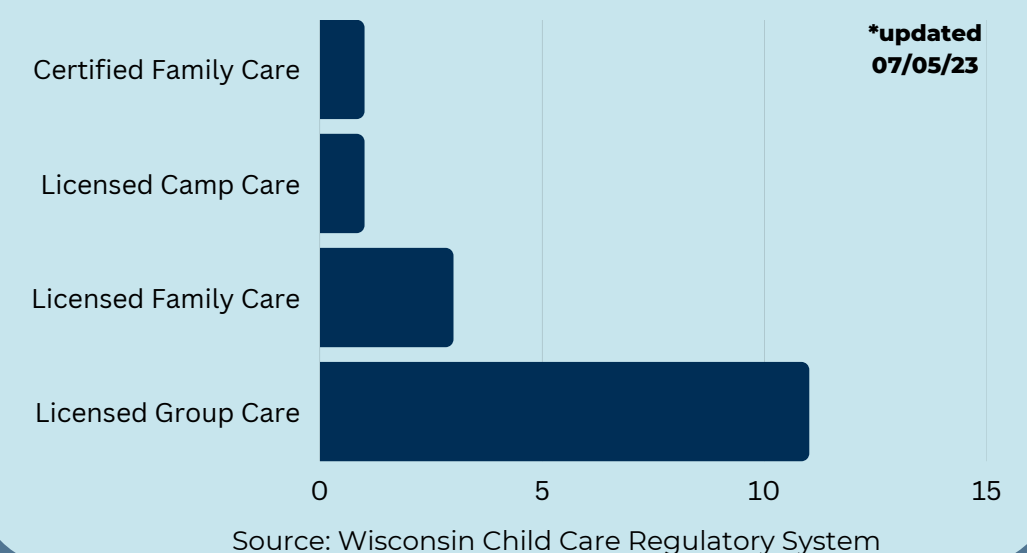

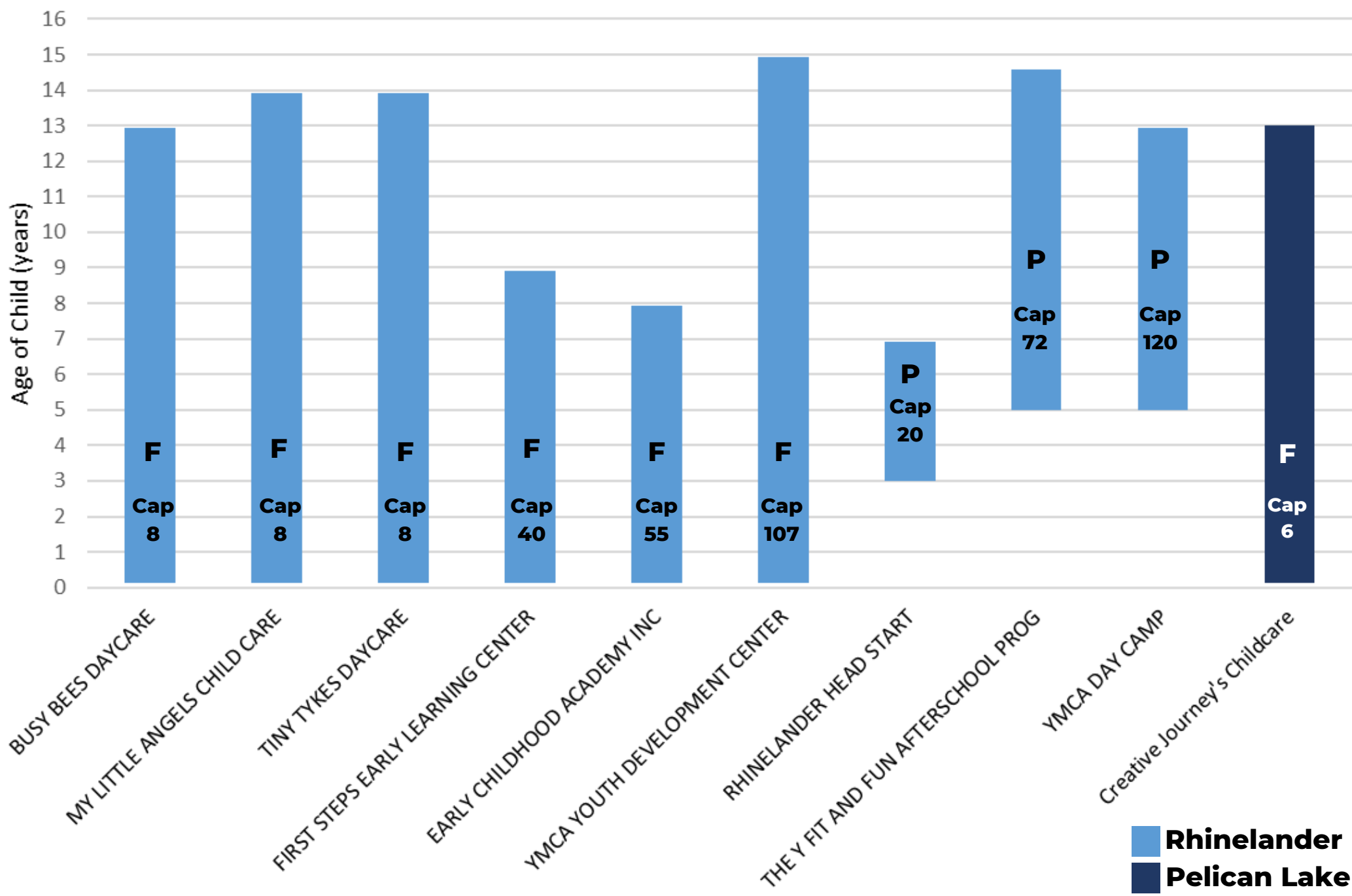

Capacity is based off of the age range of children.

For example: a childcare facility with a capacity of 8 can only watch 1 child under the age of 2 years old. If that facility had two children under the age of 2 their capacity would drop down to 7.

F = Full time

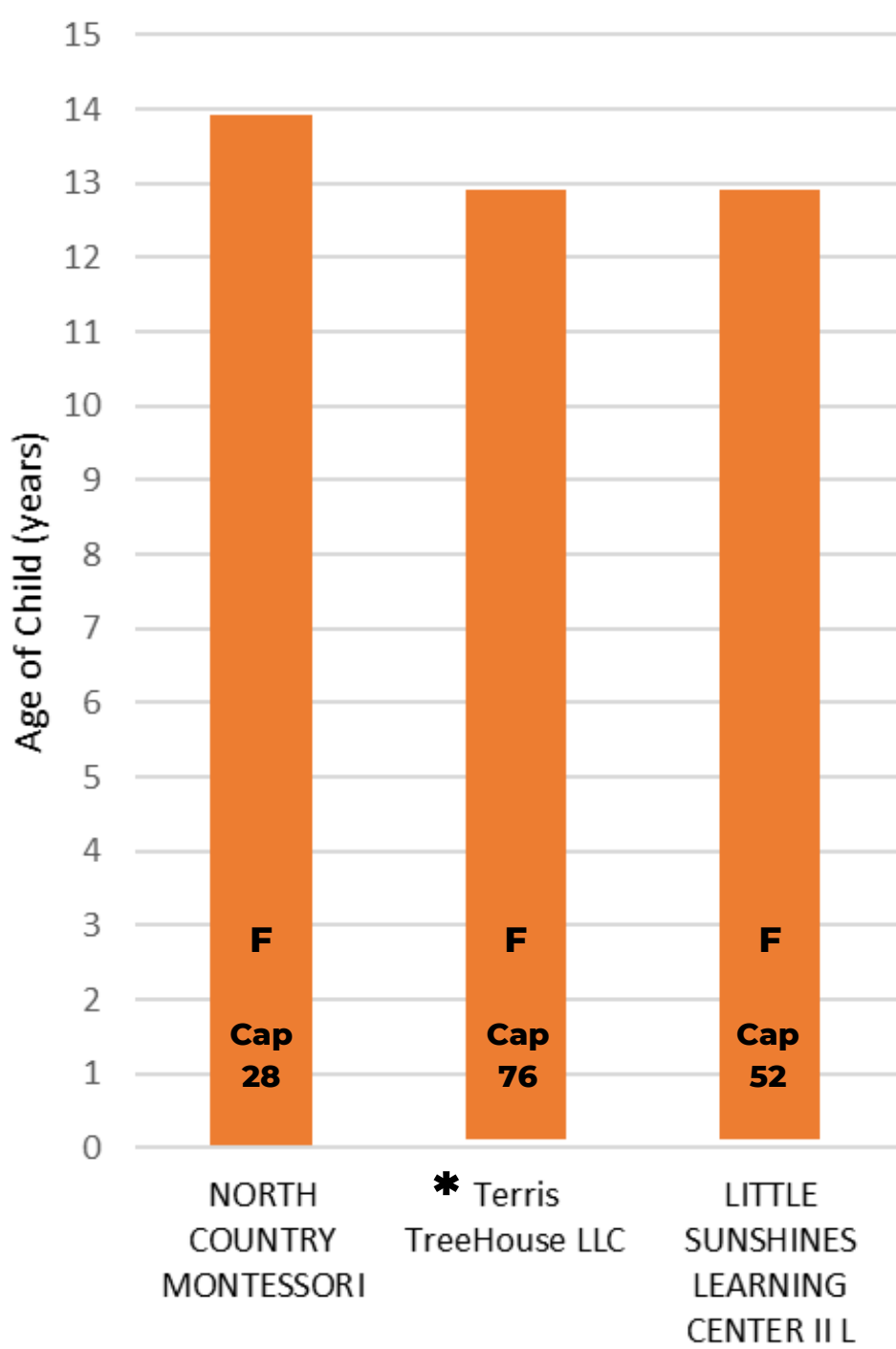
P = Part time

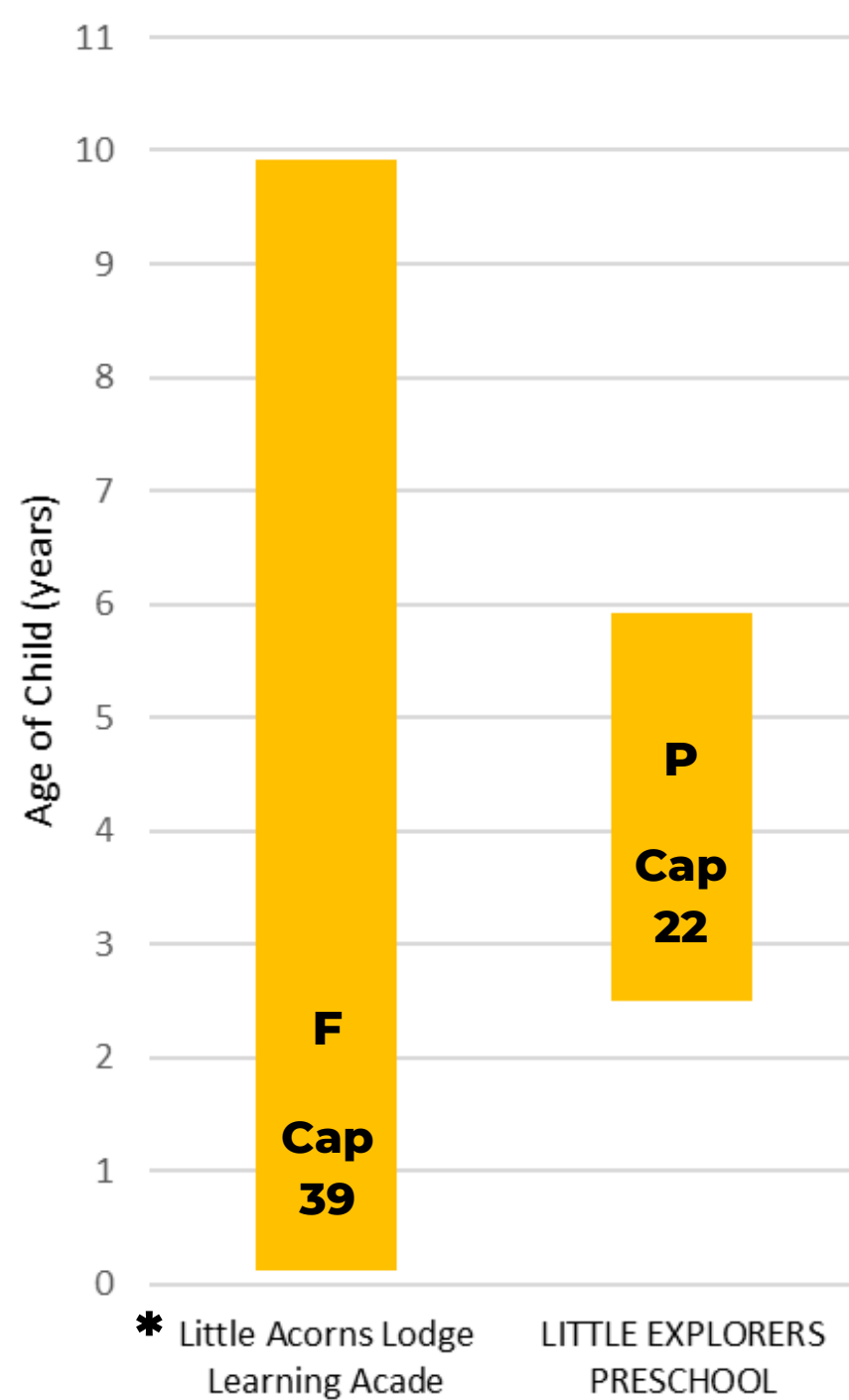
Age Range for Child Care Services

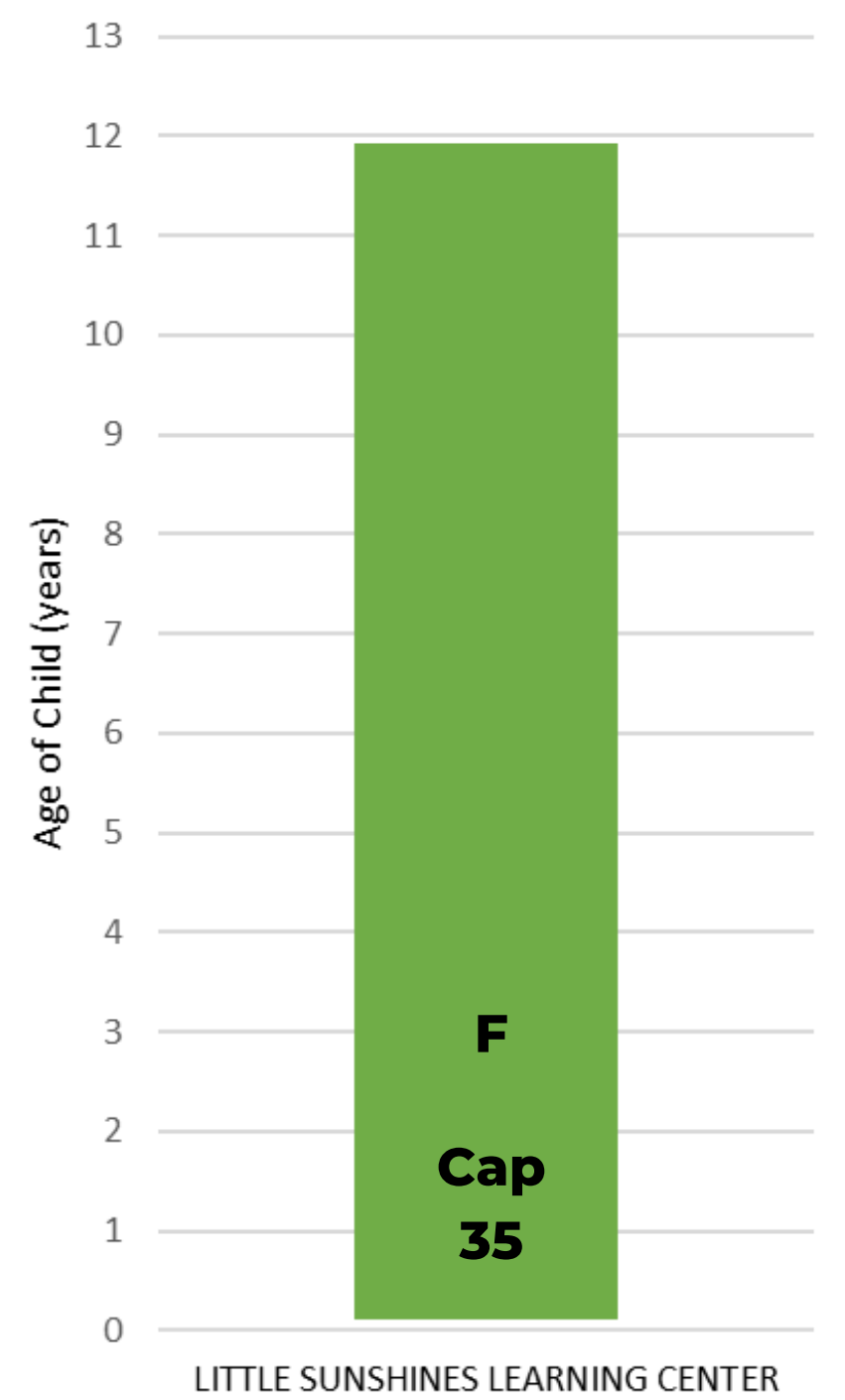
Age Range for Child Care Services
